## SUPPORTING THOUGHTS:

## Suggestions from author Kevin De Young

- Some portions of scripture are clearer than others. Not every passage has a simple or obvious meaning.
- The main things we need to know, believe, and do can be clearly seen in the Bible.
- Though the most essential doctrines are not equally clear in every passage, they are all made clear somewhere in Scripture.
- That which is necessary for our Salvation can be understood even by the uneducated, provided that they make use of the ordinary means of study and learning.
- The most important points in the scriptures may not be understood perfectly but they can be understood sufficiently.

Rich listed some responses to the Pharisees that Jesus gave. Below is a short list of them. Do you feel you are guilty of any of these?

- "Have you not read what David did...." (Matthew 12:3)
- "Have you not read in the Law" (Matthew 12:5)
- "Have you not read what was said to you by God" (Matthew 21:42)
- "Are you the teacher of Israel and yet you do not understand these things?" (John 3:10)
- "You are wrong, because you know neither the Scriptures nor the power of God" (Matthew 22:29)

Clarity is not the same as simplicity, and not all texts are as straightforward as others.

## (SUPPORTING THOUGHTS CONTINUED)

- The saving message of Jesus Christ is plainly taught in the Scriptures & can be understood by all who have ears to hear it.
- Yet nothing essential to salvation is so obscure that it cannot be found simply by reading the text on one's own.
- <u>Six Requirements for Understanding Scripture Rightly</u>: Time, Effort, Memorization, Use What is Available, Obedience, Prayer and the Holy Spirit

**CHALLENGE:** Read a portion of the Scripture each day.

## **DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:**

- What are your thoughts on this quote from Rich, "The blame for not understanding parts of Scripture is always on the reader, never on the Scripture itself.?"
- Why do you think there is so much disagreement among Christians about some of the teachings in the Bible?
- Do you have a particular verse or section of the Bible that you always struggled with understanding?
- What would happen to the church if most believers gave up reading the Bible for themselves and only listened to Bible teachers and preachers or read books about the Bible?
- John Calvin wanted members of his congregation to be "disciples of Scripture." How do you feel you are doing as a disciple of Scripture? How could you improve your discipleship in this area?
- When did you last think about the prophet "Ezra"? What can we learn from him?
- What are your thoughts about the quote Rich used that goes like this, "Too many Christians mark their Bibles, but their Bibles never mark them"?
- Looking at Acts 17, what can we learn from the Bereans?
- Are you, or someone you know, in "solitary confinement?"
